LNS History Golden Hind Project

Nine year 7 & 8 students took part in this project and since June have been working alongside Frankie on the Golden Hinde, coming together as a team to 'take over' the ship. They learnt about the history of the ship and its links to Elizabeth I, the first circumnavigation of the world and the weapons used to defend the ship in battles. The takeover consisted of the group taking a tour of parents, family members and the general public around the ship telling them all about a particular part of its history - about Sir Francis Drake, the weapons used as well as a story of a woman that was on board that had been captured from a Spanish ship. The boys had researched and created exhibition style display cards as well as colouring in sheets with information for children to complete on board or at home. We even had an information sheet that had been translated into German to help visitors learn about the ship too.

"I enjoyed it, it was fun, and it was my very first project and performance to people."

"The thing I most enjoyed is when I actually held the dagger. I learnt that they kidnapped a girl, and she stayed on board at the Golden Hinde while they was travelling. Skills I learnt were how to load a cannon and that they put spears at the side of the boat, so no one jumps on."

"I enjoyed the touring. I learnt about the history of the Golden Hinde and I learnt to speak louder than usual while giving the tour."

"I enjoyed researching information about weapons (polearms / staff weapons) and giving people tours of the boat. Weapons - I learnt why they were used when they were used and how people used it. At first, I struggled to hold the polearm but eventually understood it."


Viking Maritime Trip

We took 20 Maritime students to visit the Maritime Skills Academy in Dover this term. The students carried out activities based on Basic Sea Survival and Basic Fire Safety.

In the Sea Survival activities, students were trained on how to respond to an 'Abandon Ship' call from the Captain of a ship. This included, entry into the water with a life jacket, basic technique of staying afloat whilst conserving energy, linking to secure everyone, entry into a raft and the saving of in individual, including a helicopter lift on a harness.

The Fire Safety activity was based on students learning how to get equipment out ready for use, use a hose, understand the different settings on a hose for different types of fire, using the hose to knock over plastic containers and then drain and recoil the hose for next use. The students had great fun, working in teams to see who could undertake these tasks the quickest.

Now and Then

London School of Printing and Kindred Trades

A not often discussed chapter of our school buildings' history, is the tenure of the London School of Printing and Kindred Trades who occupied our site under various guises from circa 1922 to 1964.

St Bride's Foundation Printing School, Bride Lane, Fleet Street was founded 1883 and opened in November 1894 to teach part-time courses, it was re-named London School of Printing and Kindred Trades in 1922 when it came under the London County Council's direct jurisdiction and moved to 61 Stamford Street.

This followed the end of the building lease for the 'Benevolent Society of St Patrick (1821 to 1921) and after strengthening of the building to accommodate the print machinery the building had its second tenant. For the completion of these works the City architects consulted with Charles Harrison (who was the first to have used concrete cylinders in the foundation of Waterloo Bridge Road Fire Station to overcome the problems presented by the sites high water table).

A factor in choosing this location may have been the building being adjacent to the site of Clowes Printers, (till Clowes was bombed in 1941) and IPC another longtime resident of Stamford Street.



Clowes was situated on the junction of Stamford Street and then Duke Street now Duchy Street, being for a time the largest printing works in the world. {William Clowes on 21 October 1803 he set up on his own printers at 20 Villiers Street (off The Strand). Charles Dickens started his working life as a blacking boy at Clowes – his experiences are depicted in Oliver Twist.]

Considerable alterations and extensions started to be made to the premises, in 1924/25 an extra storey was added to each of the two classroom wings and a machine shop added in 1922/23. In addition, in 1930 of a new two storey wing (now the Malone Hall) was added to the Broadwall frontage which incorporated the site of No. 59 Stamford Street and three terrace houses along the original route of the southern section of Broadwall. The changes also involved the remodelling of the

original interior. (Roberts & Godfrey, 1951). . (Trades, n.d.)


A particularly fine architects' illustration is available in the UAL archive picturing the newly designed Broadwall extension facing out onto a 'still in existence' Broadwall roadway produced by G Topham Forrest Esq Architect to the LCC (The London School of Printing and Kindred Trades, 1931 - 1933)

In 1949 Bolt Court Technical School became the LCC School of Photo Engraving and Lithography and merged with the London School of Printing and Kindred Trades to become the London School of Printing and Graphic Arts in 1949, all at number 61 Stamford Street. The school provided full time and evening classes across two sites – Stamford St and Bolt Court Technical School – comprising some 140 FT staff and 200 supporting staff and 7000 pupils!

In 1960, one Harry Beck designer of the London Underground maps back in the early 1930's subsequently taught typography, at was by then named the London College of Printing, number 61 Stamford Street!! His pre-publication sketch of the London Tube map as below now resides in London's Victoria and Albert museum.



The London College of Printing then moved to Elephant and Castle its current location and finally became part of UAL – an extensive archive of materials relating to the college tenure at 61 Stamford Street is held by UAL.
